WHAT WE DO

- Brush Farm Dog Training Club is a non-profit organisation run by a dedicated team of volunteers, committed to serving the local community and promoting responsible dog ownership. We teach people to train their dog to be socialised and obedient, and promote participation in canine obedience sports.
- Each year our club delivers over 300 hours of training classes, trains over 500 dogs, & runs three trials, attracting over 250 competitors from across Sydney
- Training provides a benefit to both dog owners and the wider community dogs that have participated in obedience training are less likely to be surrendered to pounds and animal shelters due to behavioural problems or aggression than dogs with no training.
- Attending training for just one hour each Sunday afternoon at Brush Farm Park will give you the skills to train your dog to be a happy, well behaved member of your family.


REMINDERS:

- Dogs wearing BRIGHT YELLOW KNITTED COLLARS may be uncomfortable around other people and dogs. Please give these dogs the space they need. If in doubt, MOVE YOUR DOG AWAY from stressful situations.
- ✤ All handlers must wear enclosed shoes for safety.
- ✤ All dogs must be kept ON LEASH unless an instructor tells you otherwise.
- Dogs that have a history of running off during off-leash exercises must use a long lead in class.
- Please pick up after your dog. Bags and bins are provided.

BRUSH FARM DOGS DOING AWESOME THINGS!

We have Brush Farm members participating in multiple dog sports including Obedience, Rally, Scent Work, Agility, Earthdog and Tricks. Here is a selection of amazing results from our trialling teams:

Heidi Richardson & Cooper have had multiple qualifications in Advanced Scent Work - Vehicles at Western Sydney Scentwork, Interiors at the Northern Suburbs August trial, and another Vehicles as well as a 3rd placing in Containers at Hills Scent Work.

June Johansson & Eva qualified in Excellent Vehicles at the July Western Sydney Scentwork trial and in Excellent Interiors at Northern Suburbs. In ACSW trials Eva has also attained her NW1+ title at Paterson and NW1 title at Minto.

Belinda Young & Wilbur were highest scoring Brush Farm member in Rally at August trial with a 1st place in Rally Novice. They have also had multiple qualifications in Novice Tricks with a 3rd place at Northern Suburbs in August.

SUMMER FUN & SAFETY



Please keep your dog healthy and safe over the summer break by being aware of the following common issues:

EATING "BAD STUFF"

The festive season is often when pets ingest things they shouldn't. Chocolate, macadamia nuts, and grapes/raisins are common sources of toxicity in dogs. Cooked bones, corn cobs, avocado and mango seeds frequently cause blockages. Kids and visitors can often leave things within a dog's reach that they take advantage of! Please be aware that if your dog eats a large amount of fatty food within a short period, they could be at risk of pancreatitis.

PARALYSIS TICKS

We live in an area affected by paralysis ticks so ensure you talk to your vet about appropriate preventatives and keep up to date with your chosen products (whether monthly or three-monthly). Remember that your cats should be protected as well!

SNAKES


Less of a problem locally but certainly something to keep in mind if you go adventuring with you pup over the summer months. Immediate treatment is key for treating snakebites so make a note of the nearest vet in your vicinity and keep in mind that not all vets stock antivenom.

ALLERGIES & HOT SPOTS

The hot, humid conditions can cause havoc for the condition of many dogs' skin. Any signs of redness, excessive itching, or hair loss should be taken seriously – please see your vet for appropriate treatments.

HEAT STRESS

Always ensure that you monitor your dogs for signs of heat stress, particularly short-nosed dog breeds. Avoid heavy exercise in the heat of the day, never leave your dog in a car, provide cool shelter and plenty of water, and check the temperature of the roads/pavement you walk on!

Tell us a bit about your current training partner, what you have achieved with them, and what you are working towards right now.

Hadley is a 3 year old Cavoodle. We started trialling at the beginning of this year (2023) and have achieved two titles CCD and Rally Novice! We are working very hard on our off leash skills so we can enter CD (Novice) next year. At the moment we are focusing on Rally Advanced and Tricks Starters.

How did you first become interested in dog training?

When I was 3 my family got our first dog, and I was obsessed! Over the years with different dogs, I did bits of training and made lots of mistakes. So, when I got Hadley, I knew I wanted to do everything I could to make sure he was the best!

What do you enjoy most about training, trialling and dog sports?

The smile on Hadley's face and the enjoyment of the connection we share. Trialling is so much fun, when you get positive feedback from a judge or follow participant it's a really buzz. I've learnt so much just watching and Stewarding at Trials, not just about Dog Sports but on how to be a better handler.

What is your dog's best/worst/funniest/most ridiculous habit or behaviour?

Hadley is very sassy and stubborn. He will look at me dead in the eyes and say, "No I don't want to drop, Mum". Also, he has the amazing skill of finding mud wherever he goes, the smellier the better.

Reward your dog more! (Pretty sure that was Richard to me more than once when I was in green class). Also, you (the handler) need to be more exciting to your dog than anything else (This one was definitely from Carmen in Green class).
